## **Britain Through The Seasons**

Tom comes from a farming background and still lives on a small farm in Iver, Buckinghamshire. Having graduated from university, he embarked on a career as a sports trainer but soon decided that this was not fulfilling his ambition. He resigned from his job and decided to travel, visiting Australia, New Zealand and Africa, where he has since returned on several occasions, latterly to take stunning pictures of big

cats and other wild animals, in their spectacular habitat. With no experience as an amateur photographer, he changed direction and decided that he wished to establish himself as a professional wild-life photographer, which he has since successfully achieved.

Tom's passion for British wildlife was evident, with his beautiful photographs projected for our enjoyment and he gave guidance on what he termed to be key factors in taking a great picture. Firstly, he advised that consideration be given for the lighting of the subject and referred to the 'golden hour' sometimes to be found at dawn or sunset, when natural light takes on a different quality. Secondly, he recommended that the photographer looks for 'character' in a subject and his images certainly evidenced this. Although many of the images he displayed were filled with vibrant colour, his preferred medium is black & white, where, with the colours stripped away, the character of his subjects was seemingly revealed and magnified.

The images in Tom's portfolio were targeted and nearly all required remarkable patience and sometimes a little luck to obtain. In one instance, he had been endeavouring to photograph a Water Vole in January and to get the shot at eye level he had set up his tripod in a stream. With his waterproof chest waders he entered the water to wait. Nothing happened on the first day but on the second, the Water Vole appeared. As Tom



leant forward, in anticipation of success, he managed to dip the front of his waders beneath the surface of the water and was obliged to retreat to dry out. However, undaunted, he returned to the location and on the fourth day the little animal obliged and Tom had a magnificent picture.

Tom does not enhance his images with digital computer programmes as he does not consider himself a digital artist, but he does allow himself certain ploys to get the pictures he desires. For example, this included strategically placing peanuts to entice a Greater Spotted Woodpecker into the frame for another great shot.



We were treated to a wide range of British wildlife images through the seasons and many anecdotes of Tom's sometime very unglamorous activities resulting in pictures that provoked such gasps within the audience. Probably his most stunning picture seen on the day was of a Puffin in flight, front on, which he described as 'comical'. The image was his first commercial hit and to date he has sold nearly 20,000 prints, including his beautiful greetings cards. Tom was asked to name his favourite picture and proudly projected a black and

white image of two Lions nestling together, which he had entitled "Strongest Bond", and this brought forth a chorus of appreciation around the Plaza.

Having very recently returned from Kenya, Tom is soon to travel to India, where his mission is to photograph Tigers. No doubt he will bring back some stunning images and we wish him every success.

## **Family History**



This is a group in name only as I meet members individually in the Library for one-hour research sessions at times convenient to both of us. The location of these sessions is in some doubt now with the Library closing after 31st August. It has served us well in the past with free access to Online websites such as Ancestry and FindmyPast.

Since the "group" was formed five years ago, many U3A members have researched their family history with varying degrees of success. The records available are not always complete but we have always found information that hadn't previously been known.

Family History research is like a jigsaw puzzle. A piece of information found one month can link in with another piece found at a later date.

It is a fascinating pastime that is much more than collecting names of ancestors. The documents used for the research can tell you about where your ancestors lived, their neighbours, their occupations, family groupings, war service etc. You will most certainly know more about your ancestors after a session or two of research.

If you are interested in finding more out about your ancestors, I do have a small number of vacancies. The library is available until August, but I am looking to see what alternatives are available for September onwards.

#### **Local History Walks and Visits**

Walks are a maximum of 1.5 hours and 1.5 miles long and usually take place on weekdays. Past walks and visits include Thrapston, Titchmarsh, Raunds, Lyveden New Bield and Rockingham Castle.

Walks are planned for Kings Cliffe in June and Ringstead in July.

We are organising a group visit to **Apethorpe Palace** for Wednesday 8 August p.m. English Heritage will provide a group guide. The maximum number is 25 and the cost is £7.65. We propose to car share. A full payment is required before booking is accepted and so if you'd like to book a place please pay at the <u>April</u> meeting or ring Glyn to arrange payment.

Apethorpe is a grade 1 listed building dating back to the  $15^{\rm th}$  century and was a favourite residence for James I. It's now privately owned by a French Baron and is only open on Wednesdays in July and August.





## Lady Tresham Shared Learning Project



Work on this project has begun to tie in with the National Trust's national theme for 2018, "Women and Power", which is focussing on the female stories behind the Trust's properties. There is a lot of information about Sir Thomas Tresham, but little is known of his wife, Lady Muriel Tresham. Lady Tresham spent more time at Lyveden than her husband yet we know little of the life she led.



We are beginning to create a resource bank based on Lady Muriel and the broader experience of female Catholics in Elizabethan England. The aim is to record primary sources that we can find and document the secondary information available.

The National Trust will be able to use this resource to tell visitors more about the Tresham family and the experience of Elizabethan Catholics.
