a tiny door into the old Grammar School building, now used mostly for musical events, and then crossed the busy road to view the remains of the Chichele College and beautiful recently-restored gardens. We passed the Green Dragon to enter the castle fields to see a

Dear Editor

Your comments on the Union Flag in the last newsletter provided useful material for our English group where we occasionally debate objections to modern usage and ask ourselves whether they are pedantic. I fear, however, that in this case both you and Lt Col Kimberley are attempting to perpetuate an old myth. The Oxford English Dictionary merely notes that 'Union Flag' is 'another term for Union Jack' (which it defines as the national flag of the UK). Both terms have been used indiscriminately for a very long time, including by the Admiralty who issued a circular in 1902 stating that either term could be used. In 1908 Parliament stated, 'the Union Jack should be regarded as the National flag'. Sadly the bit about the jack staff doesn't hold up either, as the staff came into use 150 years after the flag and was named after the flag, not vice versa. (The term jack simply referred to something small.)

If you are still unconvinced, I refer you to the chief vexillologist of the Flag Institute who has recently pronounced on the matter.
