# FOTHERINGHAY AND THE HOUSE-OF YORK.

A talk given by Mike Ingram. Medieval Historian

Mike brought history alive with his talk based on the village of Fotheringhay. He said it represented a 'bubble' of English history as there were so many connections to nobility. Royalty, and battles.

He began by giving an account of the various Earls that took over the Fother inghay Estate including the first Earl of Northampton. Using a family tree of Earls that followed, he showed us the links with William the Conqueror and the King of Scotland, whose son ruled over Fotheringhay and other North-



amptonshire Estates. He added that Northamptonshire had had very close connections to Scotland for many years, way before Corby!



He then talked of how the village swapped jurisdictions for over 50 years back and forth as a result of battles with the Scots, English nobles and Royalty. We heard of Faulke de Breaute, the Sheriff of Northampton who enabled King John to seize back control of Fotheringhay and the castle. In recognition of his efforts, King John gave him a

piece of land on which he built a house known as Faulke's Hall in London, later called Foxhall, which subsequently became Vauxhall. This became the location of the first Vauxhall motors business. The Sheriff's emblem appears on all their vehicles and Mike went on to say that if you drive a Vauxhall you're driving a piece of Northamptonshire history.

Some other well-known names that were connected to the Fotheringhay Estate included Robert The Bruce, the Duke of York, and King Richard III. Fotheringhay castle became the home of the Balliol family who then established Balliol College in Oxford. Later there was a battle and the Earl of Pembroke took control of the castle and established the Pembroke College of Cambridge.



He illustrated his talk with overhead slides, including artists' impressions of how Fotheringhay castle was, in comparison to how the site is now, and explained that one could still just make out where the moat was after heavy rain.



Mike then spoke of the history and architecture of Fotheringhay Church including a story regarding its series of gargoyles, one is which is of William Horwood, a Mason who built the church in 1434, and also one of Blaster, his dog! Edward, the second Duke of York and also Richard, the third Duke, and his son Edmund, Earl of Rutland were all buried at Fotheringhay Church.

Towards the end of his presentation, he spoke of the beheading of Mary Queen of Scots at the castle. She was accused of being a traitor, and serves to illustrate the history of conflict between Scotland and England.

Mike delivered his talk with humour and enthusiasm, carrying us along on a magical journey, and reminded us all of just how important Fotheringhay is in our nation's history.


There are two groups of walkers.
