**Fiddler on the Roof at the Royal and Derngate on the 23rd April for the 2.30** performance. 'From the award-winning producers of *The King And I* and *High Society* comes a new production of one of the world's favourite musicals. Directed and choreographed by **Craig Revel Horwood**, the nation's favourite *Strictly Come Dancing* judge and master of the musical stage. *Fiddler On The Roof* stars the celebrated and acclaimed actor, director and writer, **Paul Michael Glaser** (Starsky in the iconic '70s TV series *Starsky*& *Hutch*) in the lead role of Tevye.

Tevye, the local milkman in his village of Anatevka, has always stuck by his traditions, but suddenly his headstrong daughters make the controversial choice to marry for love rather than accept whatever Yente, the village matchmaker, decides. Tevye loves his daughters but has to convince his wife, as well as all the villagers, that their decisions are actually falling in with tradition. It is not an easy task, but if anyone can do it, the wily Tevye can. Filled to the brim with classic songs such as *If I Were A Rich Man, Matchmaker Matchmaker, Sunrise Sunset* and *To Life, Fiddler On The Roof* was the longest running production on Broadway for over 13 years and when you join Tevye, his family and friends, you will understand why'.

#### Walking the Zambesi

When I announced my intention of walking the length of the Zambezi River, my family – accustomed perhaps to my occasional eccentricities – gave a collective shrug and let me get on with it. Others were not so tolerant. 'You are too old,' they carped. 'You will have a heart attack – a stroke; we'll never find your body.'

At 67, I suppose I was too old, but after a lifetime of wandering in Africa, I felt I had the experience to succeed where a younger person would not. As for the heart attack etc, I could suffer those while mowing my lawn in darkest Gloucestershire and I didn't care whether my body was found or not. So I ignored the comments and got on with my preparations. Not that these were anything more than getting myself vaguely fit and investing in a few items of kit, before heading for Zambia. For once in my life I had sponsorship and my walk was officially entitled the Zambezi Cowbell Trek 2012 – Cowbell being a Zambian firm run by former colleague, Andy Taylor.

Food was my biggest problem. My sponsors promised to resupply me at three points along the way, but I had to carry enough to keep me going for weeks on end. When I walked away from the Zambezi source near Mwinilunga in April 2012, my pack weighed a cool 30 kilograms. With 3000 plus kilometres ahead of me, that was dauntingly heavy.

Nevertheless, I was committed and for the next 184 days, I trudged through some of the wildest and most fascinating countryside in the world. From the vast, wet, Luena flood plains to the steep-sided gorges below Victoria Falls, I plodded on - weight dropping from my body at an alarming rate. I slept beneath the stars and enjoyed time spent with a variety of local people. From lordly Chiefs to drug smugglers living among the gorges, everyone was welcoming and enthusiastic about my journey. At various times, I was taken for Jesus Christ on his way through the wilderness, the ghost of explorers long gone and a Satanist on the hunt for body parts. On at least three occasions, I was asked to run for the post of Zambian President.

'You know how we live here,' was the rationale behind that particular request. 'The politicians never visit us except to hand out T shirts and ask for our votes.' Sounds like politicians everywhere, I suppose.

Villagers offered me meals of nshima (maize meal porridge to most of us) and fish, which supplemented my powdered diet and kept me going. At times, I fished for myself or ate deliciously from the bush, but I also sampled rat, vervet monkey, hippo, grasshoppers and antelope. None of it did me harm and merely made a welcome change from my daily diet of 'health food.'

But for all the feeding, my weight continued to fall away and when I arrived at Siavonga beside the Kariba dam wall. I had lost nearly 30kg and was suffering from bloody heels, an assortment of bruises and teeth that rattled like rabid castanets in my mouth. For all that, I was pleased with myself, as I had covered 1839 kilometres and only had 1200 ahead of me. I had survived the flood plains and the rocky horror of the gorges and averaged 9 kilometres a day throughout. That surely wasn't bad for a pensioner.

But I just could not continue in that state and when one of my beloved Courteney boots split across the top, I took it as a sign from above that it was time to take a break. In fact as I arrived in Siavonga, the first major storm of the year erupted over the town, with thunder, lightning and hammering rain. It lasted but a few moments and I took that as another heavenly message. Mind you, I wasn't sure whether it meant 'well done' or 'big wuss,' but it didn't seem to matter.

Having split my journey into two parts, I will now get myself and my kit together, learn Portuguese for the journey through Mozambique and write a book on the River People of Zambia. Over the Easter weekend of 2014, I shall be back in Siavonga for a three day 'fun' walk over 36 kilometres around the Kariba Gorge. I will be left beside the Zambezi at Tamarind Lodge and from there; I will be alone with this wonderful river once again.

The way ahead will be hard, but I will succeed and will finish at Chinde on the Mozambique coast shortly before my 70<sup>th</sup> birthday. Then I will rest and take stock. Perhaps – and only perhaps – I will accept then that I really am too old for challenges such as walking the Mighty Zambezi.
