
# A Day in the Life of a TV Licence Enforcement Officer by Mike Long

Mr Mike Long, who had worked as a TV Licence Enforcement Officer, began by reminding us that the purpose of his talk was to inform and entertain, not 'How to skip payment of the Licence Fee'!

When television broadcasts in the UK were resumed after a break due to the Second World War, it was decided to introduce a television licence fee to fund the service. When first introduced on 1st June 1946, the licence, covering the monochrome-only single-channel BBC television service, cost £2. At that time all TVs were Black and White and the fee was collected by the General Post Office.



The BBC started regular colour TV broadcasts in the summer of 1967. On 1st January 1968, a "colour supplement" of £5 was added to the existing £5 monochrome licence fee; the combined colour licence fee was therefore £10, the equivalent of £159.16 as of 2016. The current cost is





In 1991, the BBC assumed the role of TV Licensing Authority, with responsibility for the collection and enforcement of the licence fee. A few years later Mike, who was a Trainer working for the Post Office, was approached by the BBC to train the Enforcement Officers to be polite and diligent on the doorstep when trying to establish if the occupier had a TV. Mike had many stories of the visits made by Enforcement Officers to establish the non-existence of a TV in the house.

He entertained us with some of the excuses he had heard:

My 11-year-old son bought the TV during the night!

A pigeon fell down the chimney and broke the aerial!

I have a letter from the Queen making me exempt!

My mum told me to tell you she is not in!

The Enforcement Officers make around four million visits a year and there are 200,000 prosecutions, with 38 people jailed in the last year in the UK.

TV detector vans were introduced in 1952, but are now only used as a warning when an area campaign is in progress. Only 116 requests were made in 2016 for their use. As part of its enforcement regime, the BBC is authorised to carry out surveillance using powers defined by the Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act 2000 and the Regulation of Investigatory Powers (British Broadcasting Corporation) Order 2001.

When the officers are blitzing an area with blocks of flats, they start at the top and work their way down. On one such visit by Mike, the resident did not answer the door. When he rang the bell again and waited, he heard a muffled conversation inside the flat, followed by a crashing sound. The door was eventually opened, and he was invited in. The resident then admitted that he thought he would hide the TV but had tripped and the TV, which was only recently purchased, was destroyed. On this occasion, therefore, Mike had to admit that he could not prosecute, as with no working TV, no licence was required.

More amusing stories followed and we were surprised to learn that one offender, who received three visits in a year, invited Mike to his daughter's wedding, which he felt he should decline.

Who knew so many entertaining stories would come from a TV Licence Enforcement Officer?

#### Classical Music A.M.

This group meets in members' houses, every third Wednesday in the month. We are simply "classical music", a term which includes a wide spread of genres, composed over several hundred years, from many countries, although most of it is from Europe.



Strictly speaking, the classical period in music is that period from the time of Haydn and Mozart, to Beethoven and even Schubert, when it changed into the Romantic movement, so we spend a morning listening to recordings from roughly 1775 to 1825, those composers centred on Vienna (the so-called First Viennese School).

We base a session on a particular theme, as chosen by the member presenting it. In the past few months, we have enjoyed and talked about the following examples:

A wonderful film about Edward Elgar, including those pieces making up the secret codes in his Enigma Variations. We delved into the sometimes dark and disturbing world of Franz Schubert, including one song that inspired Bob Dylan's "Mr Tambourine Man". Another morning was devoted to religious music, a spiritually uplifting session, with YouTube recordings giving us sound and vision. This was followed by Karl Jenkins, whose output is now very popular, his cantata "The Armed Man" a thoughtful piece. Our last meeting was all about film music, with a few surprises, as well as clips from the films.

Our music comes to us through various media, CD, DVD, YouTube, iTunes and Spotify, with not an LP in sight! We have space for another two members, so if you would like to give us a try, and enjoy a

home concert, please email me. No musical knowledge is needed, just a wish to hear and enjoy something different.
