# 17th November Presentation Review by Paul Ollett The Life of Charles Wicksteed – Ian Addis



There can be few people who have not visited and cherished Wicksteed Park as part of their life in Northamptonshire or indeed from much further afield. For this month's talk lan Addis took us on a fascinating journey as we were lead through the biography of Charles Wicksteed's interesting life.

lan was born and brought up in Kettering and like so many of us has often visited the park through three generations of his family. Surprisingly Charles Wicksteed himself was not a son of Kettering having been born in Leeds in 1847 and his family moved to North Wales where Charles spent his formative years on a small holding.

He was not academically inclined but liked to dismantle machines to see how they worked and then reassemble them. His talent was recognised by his father who sent him to a residential school in Lancaster where he developed engineering skills and eventually returned to Leeds aged 16 years to work in a company manufacturing steam powered locomotives.

Charles Wicksteed is described as a pioneer and indeed a risk taker setting up a business with steam ploughs that he had designed and constructed himself. Early attempts working the light soils of Norfolk were unprofitable for this young entrepreneur and he moved his activities to the East Midlands where agricultural conditions were more challenging and his machines were put to better use with a resulting improvement in income.

It was not until 1871 at the age of 24 that the young Charles made his first visit by chance to Kettering upsetting a resident of Barton Hall who made him move his noisy machinery on. There was a certain irony in this when many years later Charles purchased Barton Hall which became the home of the Wicksteed Village Trust from where the park interests were managed.

Having decided to settle in Kettering he took up residence in a small apartment in the town centre and his prosperity increased as his ploughing business continued to make excellent returns. Life was proving to be good and he married a lady named Mary Dibb. They raised a family including a daughter named Hilda. Eventually moving into a house in London Road in the town. Charles had realised the importance of play with his own young family who could enjoy a large garden to develop and exercise in safely.

He made early plans to build a People's Park in the Northern quarter of Kettering to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria in 1887 but these were rejected by the town council. Undaunted Charles took it upon himself to proceed and the result ultimately was Rockingham Road Pleasure Park, opened in 1891, the first of its kind outside of the capital.

With improving fortunes he purchased land in Stamford Road, Kettering and set up his engineering works there which with the passage of time in 1914 became a munitions factory making military shells for the conflict in Europe. The factory occupies the same site to this day.

January 1914 began with tragedy at the death of his wife Mary after illness but he appears to have buried himself in his work and by June plans were well in hand for the establishment of Barton Seagrave Garden Suburb Estate and with the acquisition of a large tract of land through the good offices of Lady Hood this formed the foundation for the Pleasure Park we know today.

Sadly Charles inexplicably took his own life in 1931 at the age of 84 years but what a legacy he left not just in our locality but for the whole country. Surely there can be few people who have, through their vision and benevolence brought so much happiness to so many people. As lan reminded us "surely the joy in your eyes and the laughter on your lips" fittingly says it all.

#### Did You Know ???

Santa Claus is based on a real person, St. Nikolas of Myra (also known as Nikolaos the Wonderworker, Bishop Saint Nicholas of Smyrna, and Nikolaos of Bari), who lived during the fourth century. Born in Patara (in modern-day Turkey). He is the world's most popular non-Biblical saint, and artists have portrayed him more often than any other saint except Mary. He is the patron saint of banking, pawnbroking, pirating, butchery, sailing, thievery, orphans, royalty, and New York City.



The traditional three colours of Christmas are green, red, and gold. Green has long been a symbol of life and rebirth; red symbolizes the blood of Christ, and gold represents light as well as wealth and royalty.

Most of Santa's reindeer have male-sounding names, such as Blitzen, Comet, and Cupid. However, male reindeers shed their antlers around Christmas, so the reindeer pulling Santa's sleigh are likely not to be male, but female or castrated.



#### Ingredients

250g Ginger Nuts 600g Cream Cheese 100g Icing Sugar

3 Limes, zested (save Juice for the glaze

300ml Double Cream, whipped to soft peaks



4 Gelatine Leaves

100g Caster Sugar

6 Limes, juiced and pared

3-6 Limes, zest, pared on 3 with a peeler, and the all juiced.



#### Step 1

Whizz the biscuits to crumbs in a electric food processor or tip into a food bag and crush with a rolling pin

Mix with the melted butter, then press into the base of a 20cm springform cake tin. Chill in the fridge until needed.

#### Step 2

Put Cream Cheese, Icing Sugar and Lime Zest in food mixer until smooth.

Tip in the Double Cream and continue beating until completely combined.

Put mixture into the biscuit base inwards making sure there are no air bubbles.

Smooth the top of the cheesecake with the back of a desert spoon.

Leave to set in fridge while you make the glaze.

#### Step 3

Soak Gelatine Leaves in cold water.

Put other ingredients for the Glaze in a saucepan with 200ml water, Cook gently until the sugar has dissolved and the syrup is simmering.

Drain and squeeze off any excess water and stir into the hot syrup to dissolve.

Leave to infuse until just warm and then sieve the syrup unto a jug.

When cold poor over cheesecake and put in fridge overnight to set.

Carefully remove from tin before serving.
