

#### **Exciting New Project**

We have the opportunity of working with the National Trust at Lyveden on a research project this year. It will tie in with the Trust's national theme for 2018, "Women and Power," which is focused on revealing the female stories



behind many of the Trust's properties. For those of you that have visited Lyveden, you will know that there is a lot of information about Sir Thomas Tresham, but what about his wife? Lady Tresham spent more time at Lyveden than her husband and yet we know little of her or the life she led.

We hope to create a resource bank focused on Muriel Tresham and the broader experience of female Catholics in Elizabethan England. We will record the primary sources we find and document the secondary information available. The National Trust will be able to use this resource to tell visitors more about the Tresham family and the experience of Elizabethan Catholics.

# Cider Maker - Philip Saxby

A brilliant sunny but frosty morning had brought out an audience of just under 120 people for the meeting on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> January 2018.

Our speaker for the meeting was Mr Philip Saxby of the hamlet of Farndish, from the family best known locally for its pork products and particularly the famous Saxby pork pie, with the well-known actor, Roger Moore, declaring his favour for the product.



With the decline of the retail pork butchery business that closed down entirely in the mid 2000's, and fed up with the vagaries that the weather brings to arable farming, Mr Saxby decided to diversify and experiment in the production of apple cider.

For the first attempts, the apples were purchased from a farmer in Hereford. However, there was a misunderstanding with regard to the collection of the fruit and Mr Saxby was dismayed to learn on arrival at the orchard that he had to harvest them from the trees himself before he could bring them home; time consuming and back-breaking work.



His first attempts with most rudimentary equipment produced a mere 700 bottles after three weeks hard graft but, undismayed, the cider was distributed and soon sold. Encouraged by this early success, Mr Saxby invested in some 'shiny new kit' to reduce some of the menial aspects of the process, although at that time apples were still being washed in a bath tub.

The output in production increased in leaps and bounds and in 2012 Mr Saxby decided to establish his own source of apples. He made his first planting of several thousand trees, mostly of cider apples, but also the more familiar Bramley variety in the appropriately named Jubilee Orchard, but it takes about

4 years before the trees produce apples in commercially viable quantities.

The production of cider has increased dramatically in the ensuing years and currently there is a bulk storage capacity in excess of 30,000 litres at the Farndish premises. The finished cider is transported to Somerset where it is bottled and labelled with the distinctive blue label adorned with the Saxby Pig company logo.

The company promotes its products, which now include fruit flavoured ciders, at prestigious country shows in a purpose made vending unit and has recently acquired a large American truck to help promote and expand the business.

Never one to stand still for long, Mr Saxby is experimenting with a fortified drink based on used sloe berries infused with gin from a local specialist gin producer, steeping them in the apple cider. This new drink has an ABV of 18% and has been creatively named 'Slider'. Samples were available for eager members of the audience to sample. I can own up to being in the queue and can confirm that it is just the job for a chilly morning, and many other occasions, I am sure.

Mr Saxby very generously gave out discount vouchers for use in his farm shop at Farndish and it appears that it is possible to make group visits by prior arrangement to the farm, with the possibility of a cider tasting afterwards.

Mr Saxby's visit and illustrated talk was well received, with many questions being asked from the floor on the finer points of craft cider. The tasting was greatly appreciated and a visit to the farm might be timely by Thrapston & District Group U3A.

## **Nordic Walking**

Nordic Walking with the specially designed poles enhances your natural walking experience. It is a whole body exercise for people of different levels of fitness and is ideal if you have not exercised for a while or if you are looking to shed a couple of pounds.



Whatever your age, your health can benefit from Nordic Walking:-burning 46% more calories compared to walking without poles, releasing tension in the neck and shoulders, strengthening your abdominal and back muscles, reducing the impact on the joints, especially those knees and hips.

There are two Nordic Walking groups and both groups have found it to be a very social activity, meeting different people. Tuesday is for a one hour walk from the Thrapston Sports Field, meeting at 1.50 for warm ups, setting off at 2.00 pm. If you are new to Nordic Walking you can borrow poles for a short lesson before setting off.



The second walk is on a Friday afternoon with various starting places. It usually lasts for 2hrs (approximately 5 to 6 miles). It's good to be out walking & talking. As the weather has been good over the past couple of years, we haven't had to cancel any walks, although sometimes the numbers have been a bit thin. We don't push ourselves too hard; as we all have our limits, we tend to pace with the slowest in the group.

End of March - guided tour of Sessions House, Northampton (approx cost £15)



Enjoy a guided tour of Sessions House, Northampton, a very rare example of a 17th century courthouse which was one of the first new buildings put up after the great fire of 1675. The tour will include a visit to the 2 courtrooms, holding cells, a walk to the gallows, condemn cells and a look round the County Council gardens and chambers. Early June - Saffron Walden and Audley End (approx cost £35)

We will spend the morning in Saffron Walden, an old market town since 1141. The tourist office provides a printed Town Trail map; there is a local market and a museum. The town is also well known for its art galleries and antique shops. Bridge End gardens is a beautiful restored Victori an garden of great charm, located on the north side of the town. This includes a wonderful yew hedge maze, kitchen garden, sunken Dutch garden and visitor centre.

In the afternoon we will move on to Audley End, a beautiful Jacobean house and gardens. We will have a guided tour of the house, free time to discover the gardens and hopefully time for a tea or coffee in the cafe.

## Science and Technology Group

Well, I thought we were going on a visit to learn about recycling, but it turned out to be even better; *Peterborough Energy Recycling Facility* is all about taking the non-recyclable rubbish from black bins and turning them into amazing things.

Twelve intrepid members of the science and technology group were keen to go even if it was just for the opportunity

to get togged up in high-vis jackets, hard hats, protective goggles and even steel capped boots.

We had a wonderfully enthusiastic guide who answered all our questions and took us on a tour. I've never seen such a high level of safety and risk warnings. Peterborough processes 85,000 tons per year and instead of going into landfill, (as we think our Thrapston waste does), it generates enough electricity for 16,000 Peterborough homes.

The ash is made into high density breeze blocks, hardcore into road surfacing and metal is recycled. I thought the best part was the huge grabber that mixed the waste, all from a single manned control room with monitors showing the heat generated in various spots. It is transferred to a hopper and

then to a conveyor belt for burning. The steam propels a turbine and then the generator and hey presto, electricity. Even the waste water is cleaned and re-used.

We thoroughly enjoyed the visit.

We're planning on visiting Church's shoe factory in April and the Shuttleworth collection in July.
