
Speaker Eric Franklin –18 February 2022 'Tales of Thrapston and the County over Two Hundred Years'

A Very Special Event

On 17th December many of our group were gathered at the Plaza for our annual Christmas Party and an amazing fun filled morning it turned out to be.

During the activities our attention was drawn to a very special event that was taking place at the back of the auditorium and it is one of which we can all marvel at and view with a great sense of pride.

A lot of U3A members will already know Linda Lewis who is resident in Raunds and she also has many people who live in Thrapston among her friends. Linda has been a member of the Raunds Ladies Group for many years and those who have met her will vouch that she is a charming and unassuming person.

Tragedy befell her family in July 2020 with the passing of her beloved husband Tony after a marriage lasting 55 years. During the last weeks of Tony's life he courageously battled severe pain which was managed as far as possible with pain relieving drugs.

Some comfort was derived with the use of specialist piece of medical equipment called a Syringe Driver which administered the medication at a controlled rate in his home environment, obviating some of the visits previously necessary by the district nurses.

Unfortunately there was no cure to be found and the inevitable happened. There were only two such devices available at the time the Charity 'No Gain - No Pain' (NGNPUK) was founded and in short supply in the Kettering area. Accordingly only few people are lucky enough to benefit, as the demand is high.

Linda was anxious to draw a positive from this awful situation and contacted the Charity setting herself the task of fundraising to purchase at least one further Syringe Driver and they don't come cheap. Through her application and diligence after more than a year of efforts she raised the necessary £1100 and her immediate goal was reached. Apart from cash donations the Charity raises funds by selling chocolate oranges with seasonal knitted covers. Linda has knitting patterns available if any U3A members would like them.

It was with great pride that Linda was able to make the presentation dedicated to her late husband to Community Matron Laura Clifford who is based in Kettering and is a 'hands on' Administrator for our District Nurses. The presentation was attended by a representative of the local press and will appear in the Telegraph newspaper.

Linda we are proud of you as a remarkable person and a valued member of Thrapston & District Group U3A. Your selfless efforts to assist in the alleviation of suffering in other persons unknown to you is worthy of the highest merit. On behalf of us all very well done.

Tuscan Butter Salmon

Ingredient's

2tbsp extra virgin olive oil 4 (6 oz) salmon fillets 3 tbp butter 2 c. baby spinach 1/2 c. heavy cream freshly ground black pepper kosher Salt 3 cloves garlic (minced) 1 1/2 c. halved cherry tomatoes 1/4 c. freshly grated parmesan



In a large skillet over medium-high heat, heat oil, Season salmon with salt & pepper, When oil is shimmering but not smoking, add salmon skin side up and cook until deeply golden for about 6 minutes, Flip over and cook 2 more minutes, Transfer to a plate.

Reduce heat to medium and add butter, Once melted, stir in garlic and cook for about 1 minute, Add cherry tomatoes and season with salt and pepper and cook until tomatoes start to burst, add spinach and cook until spinach starts to wilt. Stir in the cream, parmesan and herbs, bring mixture to a simmer, reduce heat to low and simmer until sauce is slightly reduced for about 3 minutes. Add salmon to skillet and spoon over the sauce, Simmer for about 3 minutes or until salmon is cooked through.
