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Minutes of Thrapston & District U3A AGM, 20 May 2016

- 1. The meeting began with a warm welcome from the Chairman, as well as notices and announcements being made.
- 2. Apologies for Absence: There were none.
- 3. Minutes of the previous AGM in 2015 were projected on the screen. Michelle Collinson proposed that the minutes be accepted. This was seconded by Ann Carter and carried by the meeting.
- 4. Chairman's Annual Report. This was comprehensive and a verbatim copy is attached to the Minutes. He described the Thrapston & District U3A as growing continually and being in excellent heath. Membership is about 250. There are 35 activity groups at present, some of them had only recently been established. Our monthly meetings draw around 47% of the whole membership which is higher than many other U3As. The annual programme had bought an excellent and eclectic mix of

speakers who talked to us, sang to us, and played a variety of music for us. We heard about Talking Machines, Pantomimes, King Alfred, and life on a barge travelling the canal network, and transporting many goods around the country.

We had been able to participate in a variety of outings: going to theatres and concerts. Visiting Hamerton Zoo to take pictures, going greyhound racing, punting on the Cam, visiting gardens, as well as eating numerous lunches in a huge variety venues. Recently the Science & Technology group had attended lectures at Birkbeck and Cambridge Universities. The committee are planning a range of initiatives for the coming year with the intention of making our meetings very welcoming to visitors. We will be reviewing the Constitution and preparing for possible changes required should we need to register as a charity.

A number of social events were in the pipeline in addition to preparing for our Open Day in November and the now traditional Christmas Showcase in December.

Finally the chairman offered a vote of thanks to all the committee members and the Group leaders who make our activities happen. We were reminded that the group has just about reached its fourth anniversary and thanks were due to the pioneers who took the step of setting up a U3A for those of us who live in and around Thrapston.

5. Statement of Accounts. The treasurer talked us through the Annual accounts for May 2015-2016. Our finances were in a healthy state and they had been seen and approved by Mr Robert Dickenson. Glyn Hill

- proposed and Marion Healy seconded the motion that we adopt the Statement of Accounts. This was carried by the meeting.
- 6. Election of Executive Committee. Tricia James (Treasurer), Guinette Davies (Secretary) Maddie Godden (Membership Secretary), Rachel Thompson (Social Media), Hywel Parry-Jones, Sheila Underwood, and Pauline Johnson were all accepted unopposed. Frank Boydel (Chairman) would be standing until next year.
- The committee wished to co-opt Paul Ollett as Speaker Seeker. This was proposed by Marion Healy and seconded by Richard Swindal. This proposal was approved by the meeting.
- 6. Discussion of proposed motions. There were none.

The AGM concluded at 11.05a.m and was followed by Roy Smart talking about The Last Naval Hero, David 1st Earl Beatty.
