A Butler to Royalty - a talk by William French

Dressed smartly in full butler's fig, complete with tail coat, William arrived at The Plaza a full hour before he was due to speak to us. He set out photos relating to people and boats which had played an important part in his working life in the Royal Navy and as a butler.

When he joined the Navy, William first trained as a chef, then as a steward. When the Falklands conflict began to brew, he went for gun and First Aid training, which was handy, as William was sent in



as one of the medical team to assist casualties on the stricken Sir Galahad. Once back in Blighty, William was, after a surprise interview on the Royal Yacht Britannia, appointed as Steward in the Royal Apartments. This part of his talk gave us lots of insights into regulations on board ship, the Royals and some of the places he visited. Did you know, for instance, that Britannia is the only ship in the fleet to have a proper steering wheel? Or that the engine room is kept so spotless that President Reagan asked to see the real one? Did you know that sailors on board wear white plimsolls (no noise, please!) and trousers equipped not with zips or flies, but with a front flap, to avoid wardrobe malfunctions? And did you know that the Queen's food is tasted twice before she eats it? Her Majesty is very nice and chatty, whereas Prince Philip is grumpy. He did not have a bad word for the others, but Princess Alexandra seems to have been a particular favourite. With Britannia, William visited China, Singapore, Australia and South Africa, among others. He also offered his own view on the accident in which Princess Diana was fatally injured.

When he married, William left the Navy to become a civilian butler first at Buckingham Palace, then for Lord Rothermere, followed by Mr and Mrs Tom Cruise for 4 years. Then Paramount Studios beckoned, so William now enjoys working with film stars, Sean Connery being a favourite of his.

William gave us a talk full of fascinating details which held his audience spellbound – and yet, with not a note in sight! He is donating his fee to the Medical Detection Dogs charity.

Nordic Walk around Grafham Water with the Friday Nordic Walkers

We met at the Thrapston Co-op for cars to take us to Marlow Car Park at Grafham Water, where we started the anti - clockwise walk round the reservoir. It was a bit damp as we set off, but by the time we had covered a couple of miles, the sun had started breaking through. The water level was very low (25% empty) but still too deep for us to take a short cut. It was dry underfoot, as 95% of the track is tarmac



or gravel, with good walking. The trees are all bare at this time of the year, with most of the common local birds singing, and we have not heard any summer visitors yet.

It was lovely to see the daffodils and snowdrops but no bluebells out yet, although their leaves are showing. As the walk progressed we met others, running, cycling and walking, and a young lady came walking by. I said "It's us who are supposed to walk fast with these poles to help us along", but "whoosh" and she had gone. Great to see the young people being active. It was good meeting some old friends of ours, out walking & cycling for exercise.

Having a break after 6 miles, at the cafe near Perry, for a cup of tea and a sandwich, renewed our energy for the last 3 miles along the dam wall.

Finishing the walk with more tea & chatting, we talked about our 9 mile walk. We only do a walk this long once a month, the usual being about 5 to 6 miles on Friday afternoons.

If any of you would like to try a short walk, Polly runs a friendly walk every Tuesday afternoon at 2 pm from the Thrapston FC car park, Meadow Lane. We have spare poles available if you would like to try.
