Mr Eric Franklin - A brief history of Public Houses, Inns and drinking establishments in Thrapston.

We welcomed local historian, Mr Eric Franklin, to the Plaza, to talk to us on local pubs and the like in our area. Eric is well known to many of us and has made presentations on Thrapston and surrounding villages to our group on several previous occasions. Although not born in Thrapston Eric has lived here since 1982.

Eric had taken over three months to compile his facts for the talk gleaned from a variety of sources in the area, giving information not only on the plethora of drinking establishments through the years in the town and adjacent villages, but some of the history of the licenced trade in England from as early as 1446, when a Guild of hop flavourers was formed, right up to 2007 when smoking in pubs was banned by law.



His presentation began with a quotation attributed to Benjamin Franklin :- "In wine there is wisdom, in beer there is freedom, in water there is bacteria". Apparently weak beer (low beer) was at times a more palatable and possibly healthier drink than water in the days before the public water supply was chlorinated and made safe. Children would have received this beverage with their meals instead of water.

Memories of early TV advertising from the 1950s were invoked with 'I'd love a Babycham' being the first time that brewers had specifically targeted the female population with adverts featuring alcohol. Other brands also received a mention, with Mackeson and Guinness stout, Coates cider, Watney's Red Barrel and Double Diamond bitter beer. Many in the audience still remembered those slogans of sixty years ago.

Eric's researches had identified references to 24 drinking establishments in the immediate area of



which many have been closed for a number of years, including from Thrapston, The Cottage Inn (Oundle Road), The Red Lion (High Street) which was destroyed by fire, the Plumber's Arms, opened about 1830 and described as a 'small place of poor character' and the Swan Hotel (High Street) that celebrated its last night of trading in 1965. The demise of the George Inn occurred soon after the railway arrived in the town and there was no longer trade with stage coaches. However, some pubs are still plying their trade after many years, with the Kings Arms holding the record, although even this

has been closed occasionally for periods during its history.

Eric displayed many historic photographs of the various pubs and inns, including images of some of the town's residents whom he had been helped to identify. The Mason Arms had been the headquarters for Thrapston Town Football Club and, in the 19th century, the changing rooms were in the yard behind the pub. From a later time, some of the individual players could be identified from a photograph of the team at the time and some from a picture of regulars taken in the 1950s. A picture was shown dating from 1960 with images of members of the Fox Inn Darts Team, some of whom are surviving today.

A collection of beer bottles and brewery advertising memorabilia was on show and attracted a lot of interest.

He has written and collated a book that includes his findings which, in time, will become an even more valuable record of our past.

Is that the End of the News? By Paul Needle

Friday 16th November

Sales of daily and regional newspapers are in freefall. Broadcast news is expensive to produce and is fighting for audience figures.

In this presentation Paul Needle looks at the rise in social media news and how the way we get our news and information is changing

Paul was ordained as a Church of England priest at Bradford in 1970. He then moved into religious broadcasting with the BBC in Leeds. This led to a full time carer in Commercial Radio as a journalist, news editor and radio presenter. For 10 years he was Director of broadcast Journalism training at City University in London, before running his own media training consultancy. Latterly, he worked for the BBC in Cambridge and Northampton, as well as serving as a Vicar in local churches. For 12 years he was Director of Communications for the Church of England's Diocese in Europe, looking after printed and electronic media and advising on strategy. Allegedly retired, he still acts as a media consultant and enjoys locum ministry around Europe.

I have recently moved from my role in publicity to commence as Access Officer on the committee. It's a developing issue with the Third Age Trust and they have recently produced a website called U3APlus which provides very useful information.

I've used this site as a resource to set our actions over the coming year and our overall aim is to enable all our members to access the activities in Thrapston U3A, regardless of any impairment and disability. We're starting at our November meeting by reserving seats at the front of the Plaza for those with mobil-

ity, hearing and sight loss. There will be six alternate seats for anyone with hearing and sight loss and two spaces allocated at the right hand side for those using wheelchairs (together with a seat for companions). Please use these freely. We do not, at present, know how many of you will wish to use these, but we'll start now and increase numbers, if needed, at future meetings.



We will also ensure that the Induction loop is available to you at the Plaza. It can be accessed by using the T switch on you hearing aid.

We would also like to post the Chairman's notices on the power point presentation, but

this will require those group leaders who ask for notices to be announced to send their information to the Chairman and Group Coordinator by the Thursday morning prior to the Friday meeting. Please would you do this, if you can, for this month's meeting.

Other initiatives for the future include applying for grants to

purchase a wireless tour guide system for history walks and visits and groups where there are presentations.
